RECOMMENDATION:

- 1. Accept the work performed under Contract No. 3096, as outlined in the body of this report;
- Authorize the Department's Chief Accounting Employee to release all retention monies held under Contract No. 30% to Terra-Cal Construction, Inc., 35 calendar days after acceptance by the Board; and
- 3. Authorize the Board Secretary to furnish Terra-Cal Construction, Inc., with a Letter of Completion.

SUMMARY:

The construction contract for Stonehurst Recreation Center Facility Upgrades (#1237C) (W.O. E170927F) was executed with Terra-Cal Construction, Inc., on December 11, 2003 in the amount of \$289,900.00. The project provided for the construction of an equestrian riding arena, a decomposed granite pedestrian/equestrian trail around the park and additional irrigation systems and controls. After the contract was executed and the pre-construction meeting was held, the community demanded another public meeting. The outcome of this meeting was a significant change in the scope of work for the project which was implemented through change orders. The changes included addition of more pathways, changes in the location of pathways, addition of a concrete mowstrip between the new pathways and adjacent grass, upgrading all irrigation controllers to allow control from the Recreation and Parks Valley Headquarters office. The project, including additional work, was completed December 1, 2004.

The Bureau of Engineering, Recreational and Cultural Facilities Program (BOE), was responsible for contract administration of the project. The project has been completed and the contractor has fornished the required permits, drawings, operation and maintenance manuals and guarantees.

BOE completed this project with fourteen (14) change orders for a total change order cost of \$107,030.00 (37% of the total contract amount). The final contract amount was \$396,930.00. This high change order amount was due to the large scope change after the contract was awarded.

BOE staff has consulted with the Department of Public Works, Office of Contract Compliance (OCC) concerning the status of labor compliance and Affirmative Action requirements on this project. There are no outstanding wage violations, and Terra-Cal Construction, Inc., is in compliance.

SUMMARY:

On October 20, 2004, the Board approved final plans and call for bids for the Ritchic Valens Recreation Center - Sportsfield Lighting (W.O. #E170285F), located at 10731 Laurel Canyon Boulevard, Pacoima, CA 91331 (Board Report No. 04-314).

Efectro Construction Corporation submitted the lowest base bid as shown above. There are sufficient funds, after the appropriation of the Quimby funds to this project to award the Base Bid and to allow for contingencies during the construction of the project. The project was presented to the Prop K Steering Committee on February 24, 2005 and it was recommended that the Board award the Base Bid at \$209,000.00 at this time.

Furthermore, an additional \$57,468.00 is planned for this project to be available after July 1, 2005, contingent upon City Council appropriating the funds consisting of: \$57,468.00 in Prop K Year 8 inflation allocated, but not appropriated. If these funds are appropriated, as requested and recommended by the LA for Kids Steering Committee, by adoption of the Engineers Report by the City Council in June 2005, the Departments Chief Accounting Employee will be able to encumber the additional funds.

Staff has reviewed the outreach effort made by Electro Construction Corporation and, based on the documents submitted, has determined that a "good faith" effort has been made. The contractor obtained a MBE/WBE participation of 46% and satisfied 81 of the 100-point requirements outlined by the Board's outreach program. The outreach Document Package is on file in the Board Office and a synopsis of said package is attached.

The City Attorney and staff have reviewed the bids submitted by Electro Construction Corporation and found them to be in order. Electro Construction Corporation is the lowest responsible bidder.

The Department of Public Works, Office of Contract Compliance (OCC), indicated that there have been no labor compliance violations and that all other legal requirements have been complied with.

SUMMARY:

On October 20, 2004, the Board approved final plans and call for bids for the State Street Recreation Center - Field Improvements (#1353A)(W.O. #E170957F), located at 716 N. State Street, Los Angeles, CA 90033 (Report No.04-312). The scope of work includes the following:

- Replacement of the irrigation system at the sportsfield.
- 2. Replacement of infield mix at the baseball field.
- Replacement of the existing electrical service.
- 4. Renovation of the sportsfield

Thomsen Landscape submitted the lowest base bid, as shown above. One deductive alternate was also included in the bid packages, but as there are sufficient funds to award the Base Bid and to allow for contingencies during the construction of the project, it is recommended that the project he awarded without the deductive alternate being exercised. The project was presented to the Prop K Steering Committee on February 24, 2005, and they are recommending that the Board award the Base Bid amount of \$161,400.00, at this time.

Staff has reviewed the outreach effort made by Thomsen Landscape and, based on the documents submitted, has determined that a "good faith" effort has been made. The contractor obtained a MBE/WBE participation of 2% and satisfied 80 of the 100-point requirements outlined by the Board's outreach program. The outreach Document Package is on file in the Board Office and a synopsis of said package is attached. Thomsen Landscape proposes to perform approximately 48.4% of the contract work, and will subcontract 51.6% of the work.

The bid documents for this project state "the Prime contractor shall perform, with its own organization, contract work amounting to at least 50%," Recreation and Parks staff calculated Thomson Landscape's total listed subcontracting work amount to be 51.6%, or a total deviation of 1.6% from the required contractor participation. Staff recommends that the Board find that this small deviation in the prime contractor participation amount submitted by Thomson Landscape to be inconsequential and that did not affect the bid amount or give Thomson Landscape an advantage or benefit not allowed to other bidders.

The capability of each prime contractor and the need for subcontracting work differs among prime contractors, but historically, subcontracting work generally tends to be more costly to the prime contractor than doing the work with its own forces. This is because of the added profit and added overhead of the subcontractor which have to be built into the sub-bid.

The California Appellate Court Case entitled; Ghilotti Construcțion Co, v. City of Richmond (May 1996), involved a similar deviation from the required percentage of work requirement for a prime contractor. In the Ghilotti case, the awarding authority had a requirement for a prime contractor perform 50% of the contract work and the prime contractor's bid only demonstrated that it was going to do approximately 44.5% of the work. The awarding authority, after review of all the facts, found this to be an "inconsequential deviation" from the 50% requirement. The Appellate Court agreed with the awarding authority and further stated that "strict compliance with bidding requirements does not preclude the contracting entity (the Board of Public Works in this case) from waiving inconsequential deviation." The court ruling advised that to be considered inconsequential, a deviation must neither give the bidder an unfair competitive advantage nor otherwise defeat the goals of insuring economy and preventing corruption in the public contracting process.

Based on the above, staff recommends that the Board find that this small deviation in Thomsen Landscape's bid could not have affected Thomsen Landscape's bid amount or given Thomsen Landscape an advantage or benefit not allowed other bidders. The 1.6% above the 50% requirement bldg, translates to only \$2,600.00. Even if 100% of this amount is applied to the advantage of Thomsen, this is still not enough to bridge the gap between the other bidders. Based on this, it is staff's view that the amount is not significant. It should be noted that there are only sufficient funds to award the base bid of Thomsen Landscape. The other bids were higher than the available funds. Staff recommends that the Board accept Thomsen Landscape's bid as submitted. If approved by the Board, Staff will remind Thomsen Landscape that the acceptance of the bid does not constitute Board approval to deviate from the prime participation requirements in future bids. Contract Administration staff will continue to monitor Thomsen Landscape for compliance with their subcontracting pledges as well as all other requirements.

The City Attorney and staff have reviewed the bids submitted by Thomsen Landscape and found them to be in order. Thomsen Landscape is the lowest responsible bidder.

Staff reviewed the responsiveness and work performance of Thomson Landscape on past Department projects and found them to be satisfactory. The Department of Public Works, Office of Contract Compliance (OCC) indicated that there have been no labor compliance violations and that all other legal requirements have been complied with by the bidder.

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As proposed, the Academy will apply for a 1:1 matching grant this year. Funds that the Academy raises can be matched dollar for dollar up to \$50 per girl. The girls are charged \$50 each to participate in the ten week program which means that the LPGA will fund 200 girls that participate in the program. The additional funds are used to promote girls golf, pay for instructors, and buy equipment and supplies such as balls, clubs, gloves, and bags. The Tregnan Golf Academy has already raised over \$3,000 towards the matching grant, and will again host its' annual Parent Junior Golf Tournament in August 2005 to raise the additional \$7,000 needed for the matching grant. In 2004 and 2003, the annual Parent Junior Golf Tournament raised \$10,000 each year. This is the 4th consecutive year that the Tregnan Academy has applied for a matching grant from the LPGA.

This grant opportunity, just for girls, provides an additional Raise the Bar program and enhances the Academy's efforts to improve the Department's gender equity outreach efforts by attracting more females to the game of golf. In addition, the grant provides additional revenue to purchase specialized girls equipment, provides for girls-only access to tournaments, and additional instruction. The Academy anticipates that approximately 200 girls will be registered for the program in 2005.

SUMMARY:

The Department of Recreation and Parks began self-operation of the Sherman Oaks Castle in 1993. At that time, with the exit of former Castle concessionaire, Malibu, Inc., the Department embarked on an experiment in entrepreneurship that was structured with the Department as general manager of the facility and operator of miniature golf, while separate, private concessionaires were placed on agreements to provide specialized services in areade games, a batting eage, and food service. Since assuming operations, the Department has adhered to the principal that operation of the Castle must be an integrated entertainment experience, seamless from the public perspective relative to whether one or multiple entities are operating various elements of the facility. To that end, the Department uses our own staff to handle the birthday party business, we provide staff to do redemptions for the areade prizes, and we advance the costs for facility maintenance, security, advertising, equipment, supplies, repairs, and improvements at the Castle. The concessionaires' share of these costs have been recouped through retention of a portion of the rent they pay.

The cost of operating the Castle is funded from the revenue of the Castle's miniature golf component, of which 50% is deposited to the Municipal Recreation Account (MRP) Account MG1, and 50% to the Department's General Fund. In 2004, over \$580,000.00 in miniature golf revenue which was deposited to the General Fund.

At the meeting of November 28, 2001, the Board approved a small surcharge on existing concessionaire rental payments to offset a portion of the shared, overall operations costs of the Castle (Report 01-420). In discussions with the Office of the City Controller in 1995, the Department had identified a flat monthly fee to deduct from the monthly remittances of concessionaire to offset a proportional share of the operating expenses. Specifically, the Accounting Section had totaled a monthly a verage operating cost of \$12,000, and recommended the following spread based on proportions of total revenue earned at the facility.

Cost of supplies and equipment have escalated over the last decade with inflation, and costs of labor have increased, in some cases exceeding inflationary pressures. For example, the average cost of contract security was \$7,000 in the 1995 calculation of shared expenses, and for 2005 it will average \$10,000 under newly approved General Services Department security contracts. Also, with the encouragement and participation of the concessionaires, the Department has been more aggressive in advertising, using local cable television for example, and have completed a series of high profile improvements such as doubling the restroom capacity. For 2005, we estimate the shared monthly cost to be:

Custodial Supplies: \$1,317
Security: 10,000
Advertising: 1,938
Equipment: 1,155
Repairs/Maintenance: 3,083
Redemption Staff: 2,166
Postroom Construction: 1,247

Restroom Construction: 1,347 (10-year straight-line amortization of \$161,652)

This fixed surcharge will have no direct impact on the concessionaires. It will ensure that the Castle is independent from need for General Fund subsidy, although it will result in a net monthly decrease of \$5,268.60 in General Fund revenue. Staff is currently finalizing new Requests for Proposals for all three concession elements at the Caste, which we feel may yield increased rent possibilities by offering longer contract terms (concessionaires currently operate month-to-month).
